HISTORICAL NOTES

History Jottings -Rocky Store School

Many years ago, New Baltimore had as many as 17 of its own school districts. One of them was the first Rocky Store school, located near the intersection of Dean's Mill Road and Route 51. The name probably derived from an actual store near the original school. There still is an ancient stone building that some people think may have been the store or even the school.

In 1892, three districts were combined into one and housed in the newly built second Rocky Store school. The facility was modern for its day, with a double outhouse for boys and girls, desks that were screwed down, and a nice new bell. There also were individual cloakrooms for boys and girls, one in each corner of the front of the building. Children in grades one through eight (one through three near the end of its life) were educated in the building, and the class rosters over the years contained such familiar names as Albright,

Hallock, and Dietz.

Official business of Town government was conducted in various locations over the years, including the Imperial Hotel and the Wheat store on Main Street in the hamlet, both buildings now long gone.

The first Town meeting was held

in 1811 when New Baltimore was formed from the Town of Coxsackie. The initial governance session likely was in a tavern at the intersection of the modern Route 51 and Roberts Hill Road and the second near Medway Four Corners.

As the 1960s dawned, the move to centralize schools was gaining momentum. The Rocky Store school was closed and, by the middle of the decade, the building was conveyed to the Town from the Central School District No. I of Coxsackie, Athens, New Baltimore, and Cairo.

Municipal meetings had been held in rented space in Cornell Hall, the home of the Cornell Hook and Ladder fire company. By 1965, the firemen were looking for a larger home to handle more modern equipment, and the Town for more permanent quarters. The

Rocky Store school was renovated, and the first Town Board meeting held there in May of 1965.

As New Baltimore looked to 2000, the Town Board saw a need to have more space to house the increasingly complex governance of the community. After public hearings and extensive consideration, a new addition was constructed while maintaining maximum possible architectural integrity of the old school building. The Town Board announces with sincere regret the resignation of Cless Bush as Historian. We sincerely appreciate his many years of service, dedication to our town and its residents, and his passion for our historical heritage.

A handful of years ago, talks started about renovating the inside of the meeting room to remove the old paneling and make the place a little more like it was when the last students left. Money, though, was in short supply. This year, Town Justice Joseph Cosenza spearheaded a request for a grant from the State Office of Court Administration to make the room a more professional venue for court sessions and, of course, Town Board meetings and other events that occur there. Toward the end of September, the noted local contractor Scott Purdy was at work on the project.

FARMERS' MARKET

The Market offers free hot coffee and warm and friendly people. The Market is managed by town resident Hilary Schrauf who does a tremendous job organizing and keeping both the customers and vendors happy, along with finding all the musicians who volunteered their time to entertain and showcase the music at the market this season.

The Members of the Town's 2010 Farmers' Market Committee are President Liz LoGiudice, Vice President Susan McCuen, Treasurer Jack Dirrigl, Fran Melick, Patricia Monks, Christopher Norris, Recording Secretary Lynn Taylor, and Market Manager Hilary Schrauf. We would like to thank all our vendors that made this year the best yet — The HoneyBee, Handcrafts, Otter Creek Farm, Pegasus Restaurant, the Girl Scouts, Raven's Roost Farm, Erna's Baked

Goods, and Crimson Valley Nursery.

Looking forward to next year, the Market plans to have local artists and craft makers come to the Market one Saturday each month to display and sell their wares. A fundraiser for the local food pantry will include a "bowl and



soup" sale where handcrafted soup bowls will be sold and then filled with soup made from locally grown vegetables with all proceeds going to the pantry.

New vendors are always welcome and encouraged to try out the Market. Vendors pay a \$5 membership fee, and also a \$5 stall fee for each day they vend at the Market. The Cornell Hook & Ladder Auxiliary celebrated 50 years of service with a dinner and special ceremony held on September 25, 2010 at Anthony's Banquet House in Catskill. On September 29,1960, 26 women from New Baltimore met at Cornell Hall to organize an Auxiliary, elect officers and hold its first meeting. By the end of their first year, the membership had grown to 34 members.

During the Auxiliary's 50 years of service they have met in three different firehouses, held numerous fundraisers, marched in many parades and have been there to provide refreshments to the Fire Company during calls any time of the day or weather condition. The Auxiliary has worked cooperatively with the Fire Company throughout the years during such events as their Annual Palm Sunday Pancake Breakfast, Children's Halloween Party, the Children's Christmas/Holiday Party and Agfest. The Auxiliary also sponsors scholarships for seniors from both RCS and C-A High Schools who live within their Fire District. With a membership of 52 women and men, they continue to work hard to serve both the Fire Company and their Community.

A FRIENDLY REMINDER

The Greene County Department of Motor Vehicles reminds residents to keep our revenue here and process driver's license and registration renewals locally instead of mailing to Albany. Keep revenue in Greene County and mail to or visit the Greene County Clerk, 411 Main Street, Catskill, NY 12414.

DOG LICENSE CHANGES

On January 1, 2011, the responsibility for authorizing and maintaining dog licenses shifted from the state to local governments, allowing towns to keep all revenue. Following two public hearings, the Town Board enacted Local Law 1 of 2010.

All dogs must be licensed with the Town Clerk at the age of four months and are required to have a current Certificate of Rabies. The fees are \$7 for spayed or neutered dogs and \$15 for unspayed or unneutered dogs The town does not require a license for any guide dog, service dog, hearing dog,

or detection dog.

Residents are notified two weeks before renewal and have 30 days to renew after the end of their expiring month. The \$5 late fee has been waived until July 1.



2011 RABIES CLINIC

Greene County Public Health has announced a rabies clinic for dogs, cats, and ferrets on **March 30** at the Medway-Grapeville Firehouse beginning at 6 PM. All dogs must be leashed and cats need to be in a reliable carrying case. There is no charge, but donations will be accepted.
